Introduction

Welcome to our third annual report on the distribution of financial aid among UCCS students. The report is intended to satisfy the need for greater transparency and to inform campus decision-makers as well as students and their families about types and amounts of aid.

Included in the analysis are financial aid distributions throughout aid year 2012-2013 among students who were enrolled during the Fall 2012 semester. New to the report this year is a separate summary specific to graduate students.

The information is presented in a variety of tables and charts with minimal narrative so as to avoid the infusion of subjective biases. Undergraduate Financial Aid

First, a brief primer on Cost of Attendance, Need, and Estimated Family Contribution; these are three vital calculations that determine a student's budget and eligibility for financial aid. The primer is followed by brief summaries of aid sources and aid types. The Office of Institutional Research is responsible for the methods used in this report. *For the best explanation of financial aid, always refer to the Office of Financial Aid at www.uccs.edu/finaid.*

Estimating Costs and Need

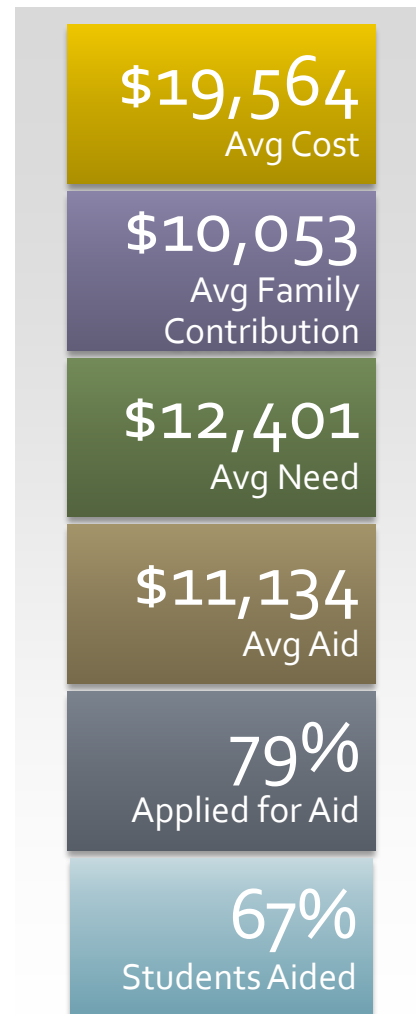
The **cost of attendance** includes room and board, textbooks, transportation, and other living expenses in addition to tuition and fees for Fall and Spring terms. At UCCS, the cost of attendance is similar to the budget assigned to each financial aid applicant. It is also similar to the “net price” for attending the institution.

The **expected family contribution** (EFC) is calculated by the US Department of Education and uses information reported in the FAFSA when students apply for aid. EFC incorporates several factors for dependency, family size, and individual and household income. Both the cost of attendance and estimated family contribution are used to calculate need.

Need is the cost of attendance minus the expected family contribution; it is calculated for all students who apply for financial aid.

In turn, all aid can be categorized as either need-based or non-need based. Need based aid has eligibility criteria in which students’ financial circumstances are taken into account. Non-need based aid is distributed based on students’ merit or ineligibility for need based aid. Non-need based aid includes merit-based scholarships, PLUS loans, unsubsidized Stafford loans, and non-need Colorado work study. Most non-need aid can be used to meet a student’s need if need-based aid has not covered their costs. Remaining costs are considered **unmet need**.

Among 8477 undergraduate students¹ in Fall 2012, 79% applied for aid and 67% received financial aid. Among those students who applied for aid, the average cost of attendance was \$19,564 and the average family contribution was \$10,053. The average need was \$12,401 and the average amount of aid among recipients was \$11,134. On average, their total aid met 53% of their cost of attendance and their expected family contribution met 47% of their costs.²



¹ The total population of students includes all enrolled on main campus or extended studies, whether eligible for aid or not.

² Average total aid and EFC may exceed 100% of the cost of attendance because students can receive aid in excess of costs and because the COA and EFC can change throughout the aid year (as well as a student’s eligibility and academic progress). While need determines the maximum amount of need-based aid a student can receive, the student could also receive merit-based aid.

Federal, State, and Institutional Sources of Aid

Federal Aid comes in the form of loans, grants, and work study. At UCCS, this includes Federal Stafford Loans, Federal Perkins Loans, Federal PLUS Loans, Federal Pell Grants, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOG), and Federal Work Study.

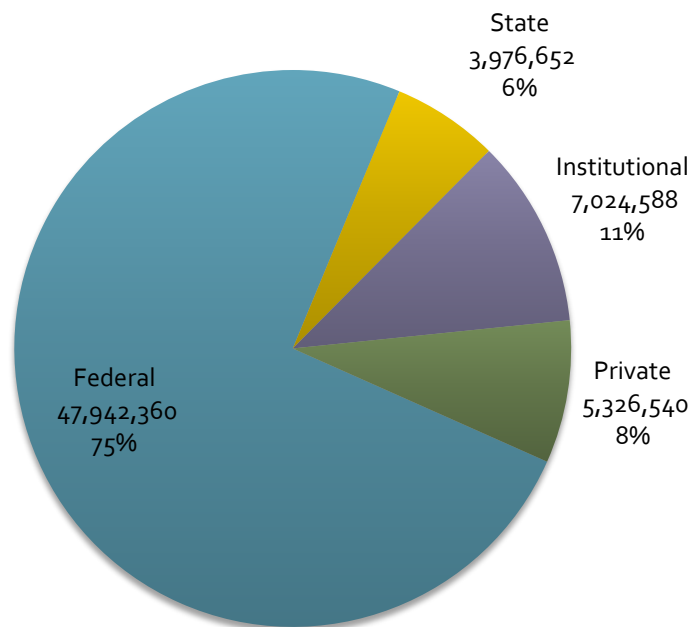
While Stafford Loans are available for most students, Perkins Loans are limited to students with high need, and PLUS loans are available to only parents and graduate students. Pell Grants are limited to students with extraordinary need. Thus, not all students are eligible for all types of aid and in most cases there are citizenship, residency, full-time enrollment, GPA, and/or family income standards to meet prior to gaining eligibility.

State Aid is provided via state government and includes Colorado State Grant, GearUp Scholarships, and Colorado Work Study.

Institutional Aid includes institutional and athletic scholarships.

The College Opportunity Fund (COF) for residents of Colorado is considered a part of tuition rather than financial aid. Likewise, many military benefit programs fund students' educational costs but are not always considered financial aid. Education tax credits and deductions also help students cover the cost of their education, but those data are not included as financial aid.

Sources of Aid



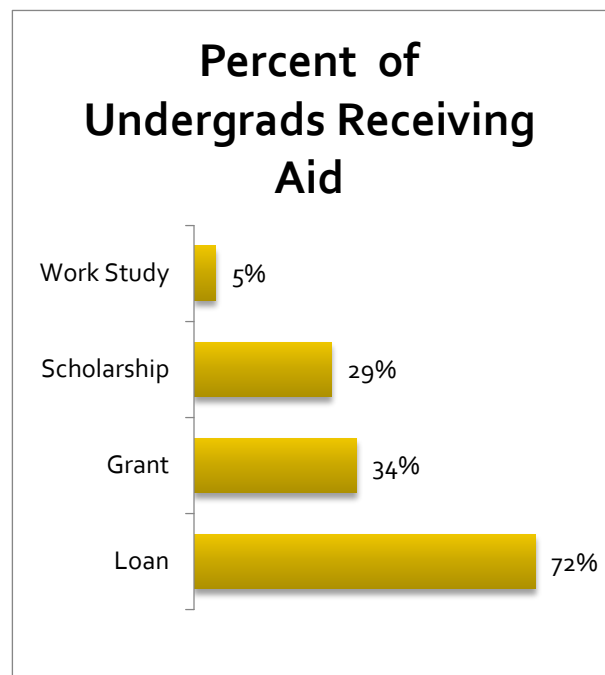
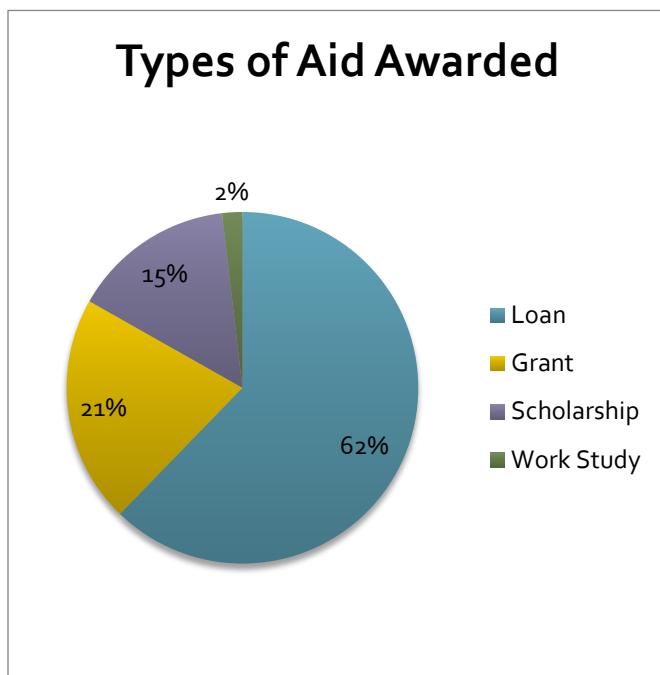
Scholarships, Loans, and Other Types of Aid

Aid comes in the form of scholarships, grants, work study, and loans. Scholarships and grants do not require repayment and are the most desirable type of aid from the student perspective. Perkins and Subsidized Stafford Loans are more desirable than other loans because the government subsidizes the interest while the student is enrolled. The government does not cover the interest for Unsubsidized Stafford Loans but they do regulate the interest rate, which is usually better than private loan interest rates. Federal Need-Based Work Study is also subsidized by the government, but the funds are provided to institutions to cover wages earned by students. For example, an office which hires a student eligible for federal work study might see 75% of the wages provided by the government rather than covering 100% of the wages directly from their own budget.

The vast majority of aid was in the form of loans (62%), followed by grants (21%), scholarships (15%), and work study (2%).

Approximately 50% of enrolled students received a loan in comparison to 37% who received a grant and 30% who received a scholarship. Four percent of students earned a work study award.

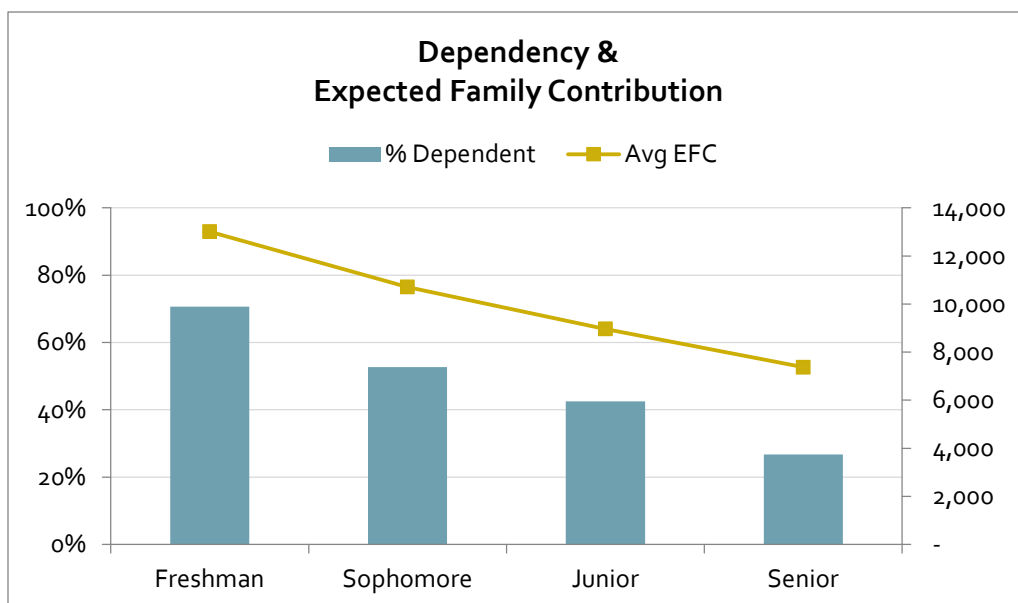
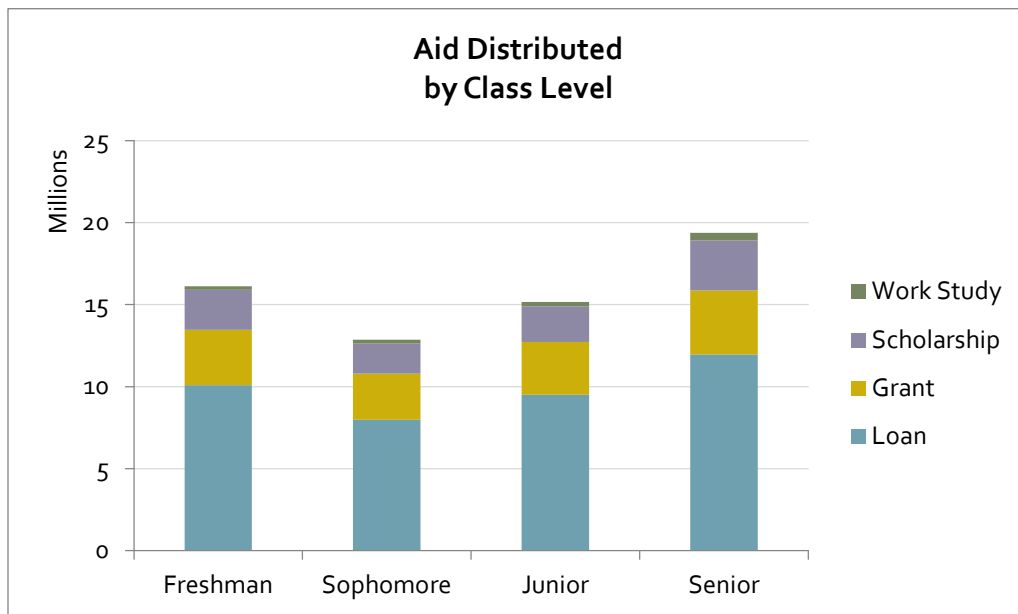

Student Characteristics

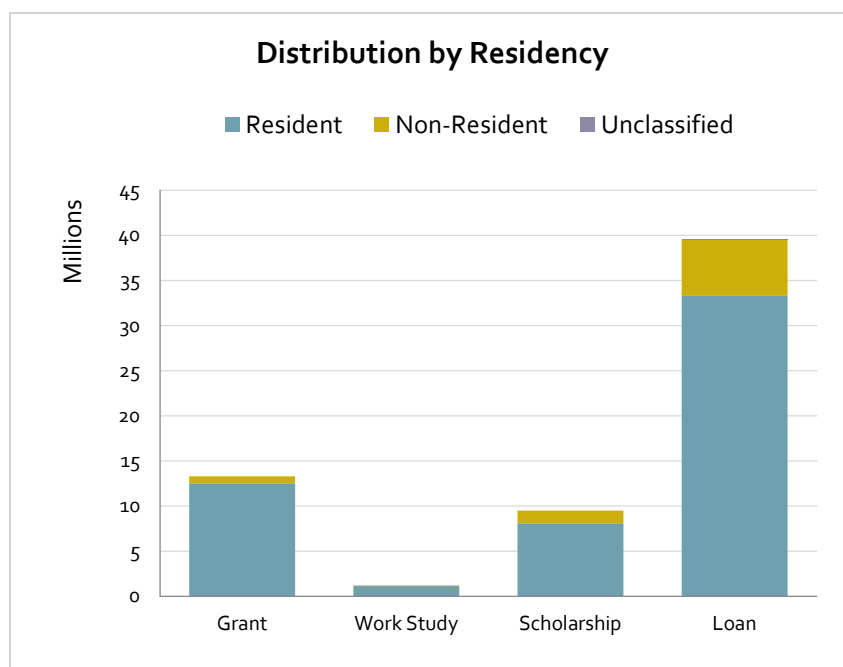
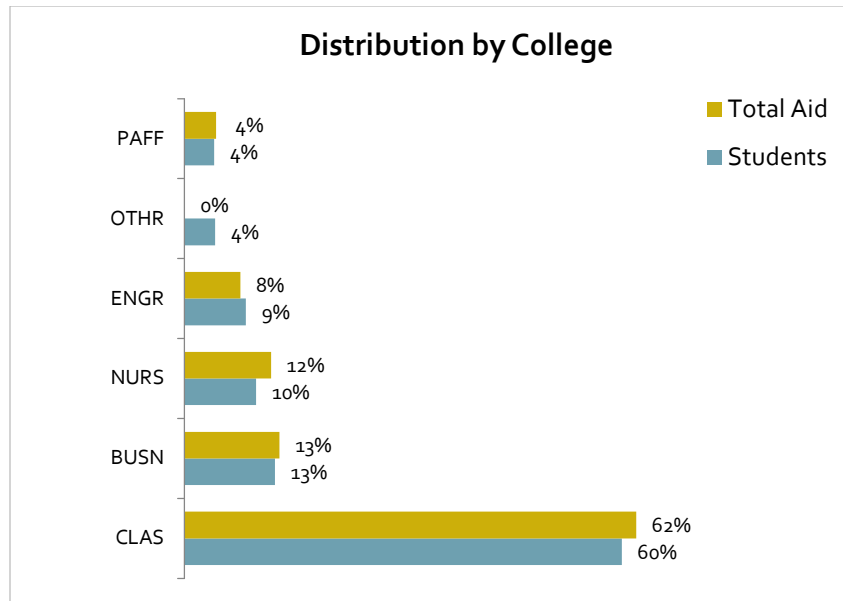
Class Level and Dependency

Detailed tables at the end of this document show the distribution of *total* dollar amount disbursed (Table 1), *average* dollar amount disbursed (Table 2), and *percent* of aid disbursed (Table 3) across categories of student characteristics. A selection of these data are illustrated in the charts below. The first two side-by-side charts show the amount and type of aid distributed to students by their class level. Seniors receive a relatively larger share of loan and grant aid than students in other class levels, but they tend to have greater need because they are less likely to be dependent on their parents.



College and Residency

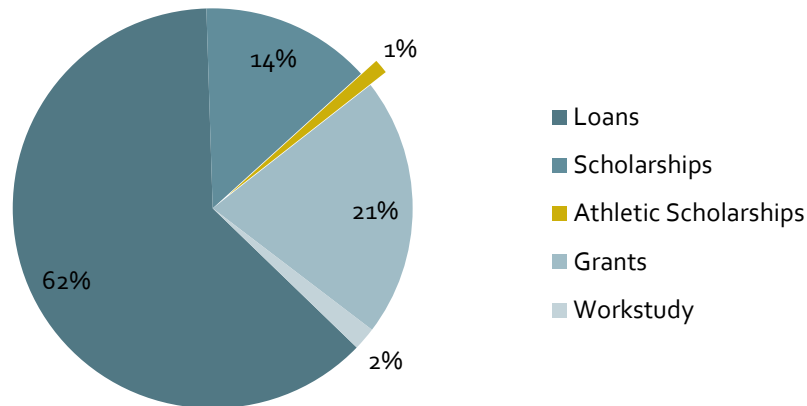
The resemblance of students and aid distributed by college is remarkable, indicating that aid is not concentrated in any particular college although tuition rates differ by college. The distribution by residency indicates that the bulk of work study (96%) and grant aid (94%) as well as scholarship aid (85%) is distributed to non-residents. During the fall semester, 87% of the undergraduate students were Colorado residents.



Undergraduate Athletic Scholarships

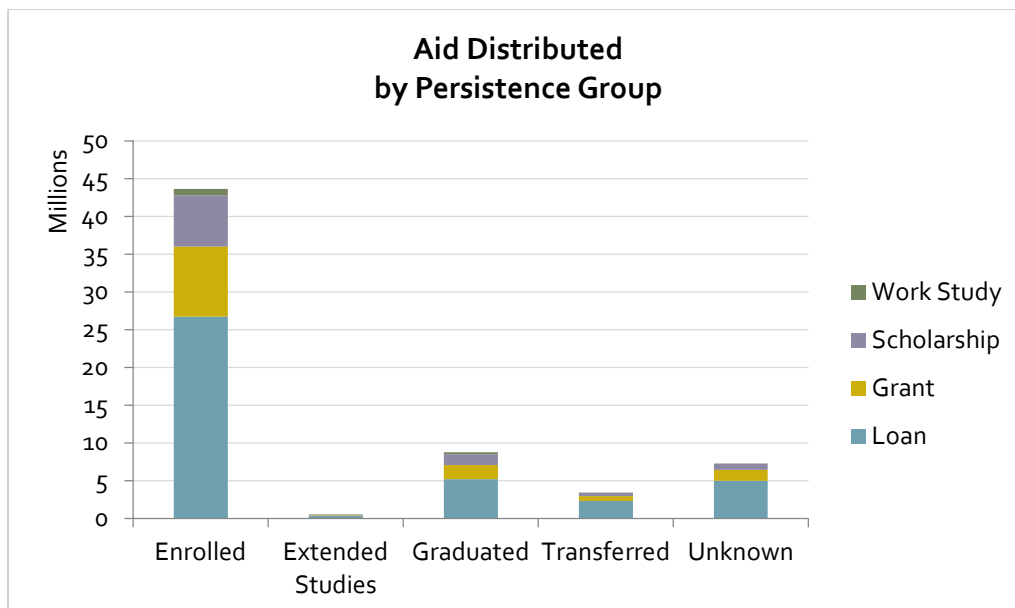
A total of 146 undergraduates received an athletic scholarship; \$745,874 dollars were disbursed for an average award of \$5,109. The athletic scholarships comprised 7.9% of undergraduate scholarship aid and 1% of total undergraduate aid. The 146 undergraduates with athletic aid earned an average 3.22 GPA for the Fall 2012 semester and, as of Fall 2013, 75% persisted, 12% graduated, 6% transferred to another institution, and the status of the remaining 7% is unknown.

Undergraduate Aid Featuring Athletic Scholarships

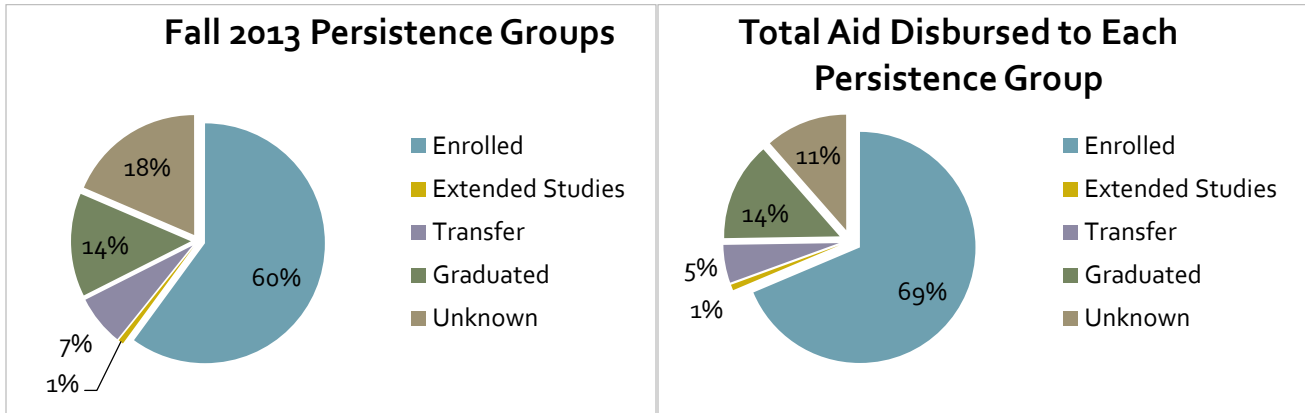


Student Persistence & Transfers Out

In this analysis, the intention is to show the distribution of aid to students according to the students' enrollment status one year later. With the increasing pressure to leverage financial aid for better persistence outcomes, these results indicate that the existing financial aid distribution is concentrated among students who return to UCCS. Only 13% of loan aid, 11% of grant aid, 8% of scholarship aid, and 6% of work study aid had been disbursed to students who appear to have dropped out of higher education.



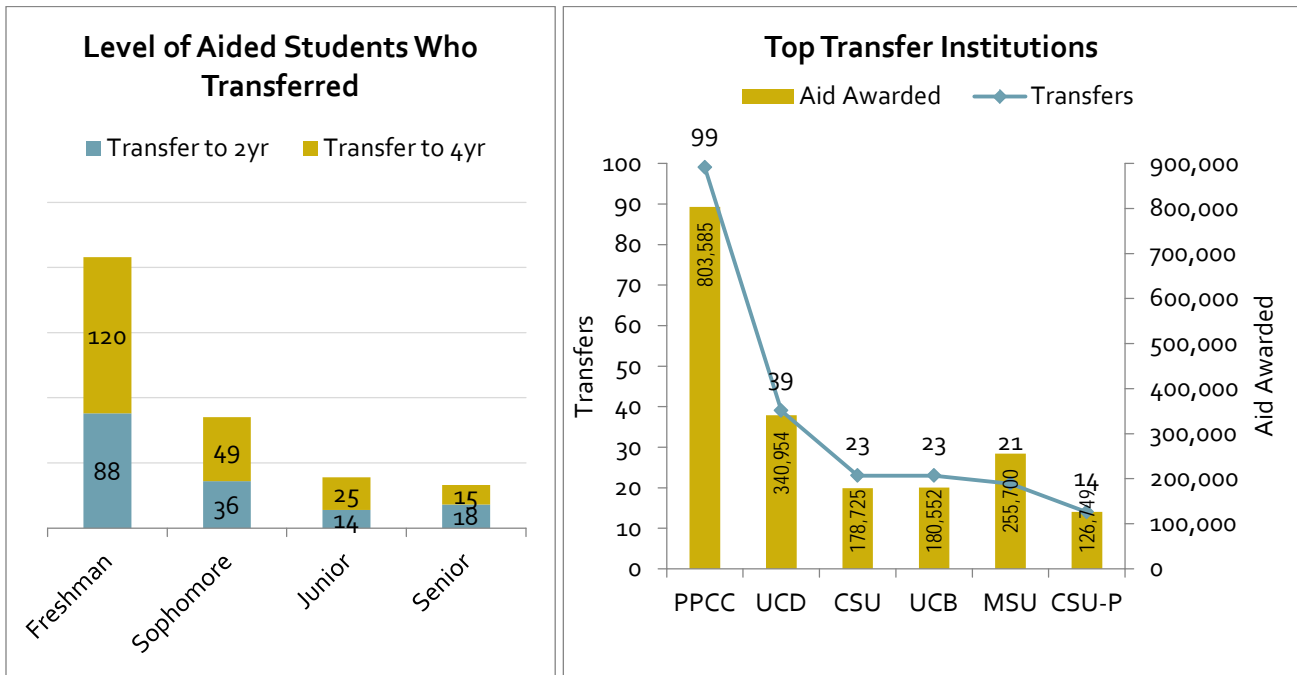
The pie charts (below) show the enrollment status of undergraduate students one year later, in Fall 2013, and the amount of aid distributed to those students. Note that a bigger proportion of aid (70%) went to students who persisted at UCCS (60%) with only 11% of the aid disbursed to students who dropped out of college (and 68% of that aid was in the form of loans).



Among the students known to have transferred to another institution by Fall 2013, their average aid award was smaller for each type of aid compared to students who continued to enroll at UCCS. The proportions of each transfer group receiving each type of aid are similar, but noticeably smaller than the proportions of persisting students receiving each type of aid.

Aided students who transferred to another institution by Fall 2013 were mostly resident freshmen who transferred to institutions in Colorado. The most common destination was Pikes Peak Community College. The 99 students who had received aid at UCCS and then went to PPCC had received \$803,585 in aid at UCCS, making up 24% of the aid awarded to transfers out.

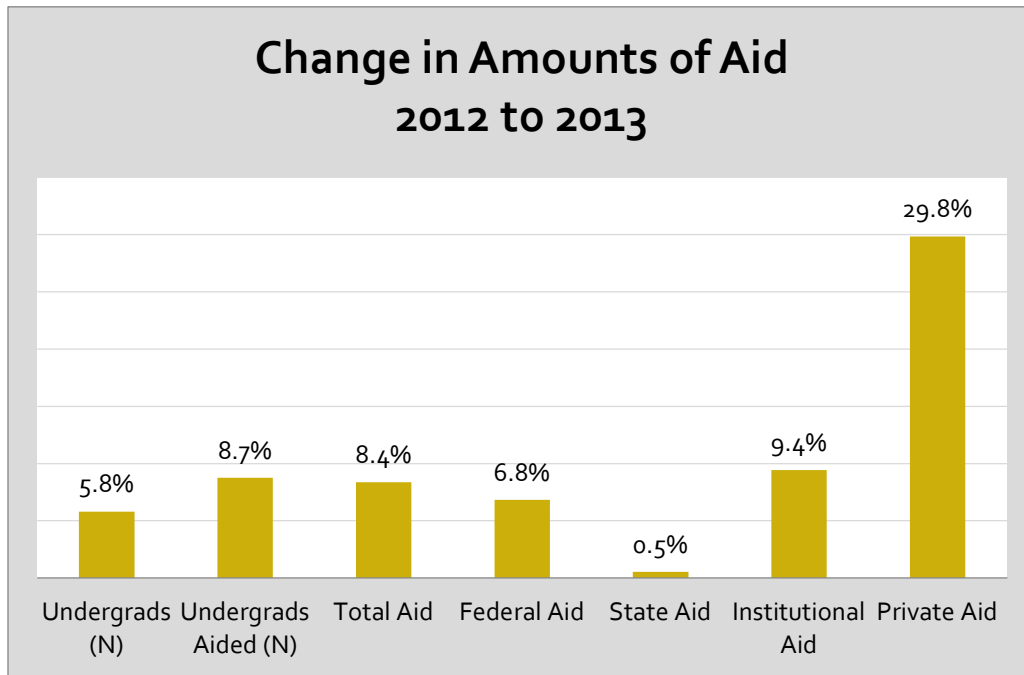


Trends

State Aid Stagnates

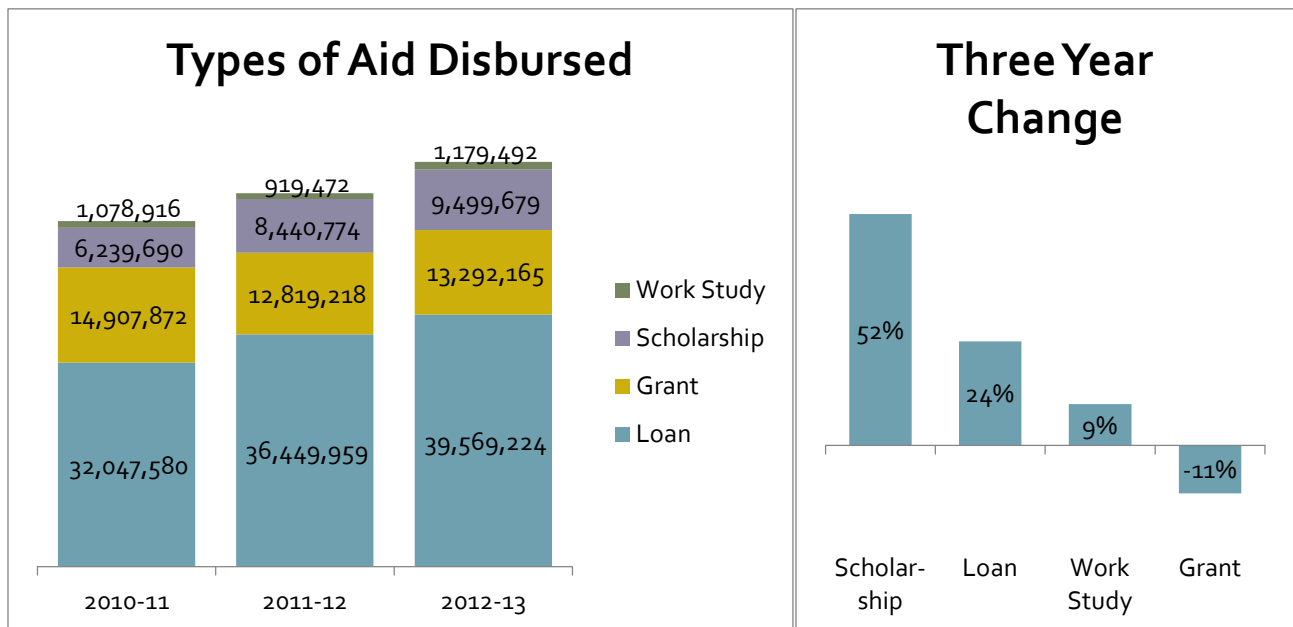
While the number of undergraduates increased by 5.8% between 2012 and 2013, the number receiving aid increased by 8.7% along with an increase in aid dollars of 8.4%. Financial Aid from the state increased by less than 1% while other types of aid grew in order to meet student needs. Federal aid increased by 6.8% (\$3.0 million), institutional aid by 9.4% (\$605,000), and private aid increased by nearly 30% (\$1.2 million).

Loans and Scholarships Increase

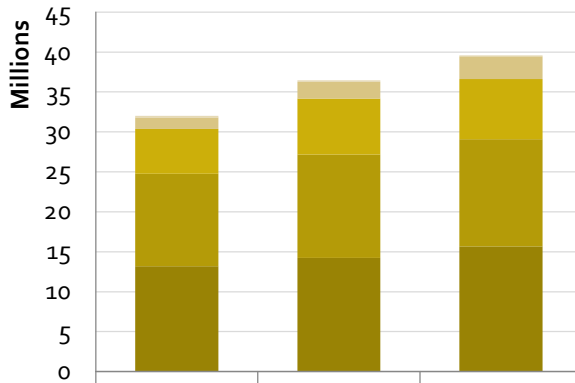
Loan aid continues to increase. Between 2011 and 2013, loan aid increased by more than \$7.5 million or 23.5%. Scholarship aid has increased by \$3.2 million since 2011 and work study aid increased by a total of \$100,576. Grant aid declined from 2011 to 2012 and although this year's amount increased, the total grant aid is still 10.8% less than the amount in 2011.



Among loans, recall that there are federal, private, and parent PLUS loans. The chart below shows the distribution amounts per type of loan over each of the past three years. All have increased except the Federal Perkins Loan,

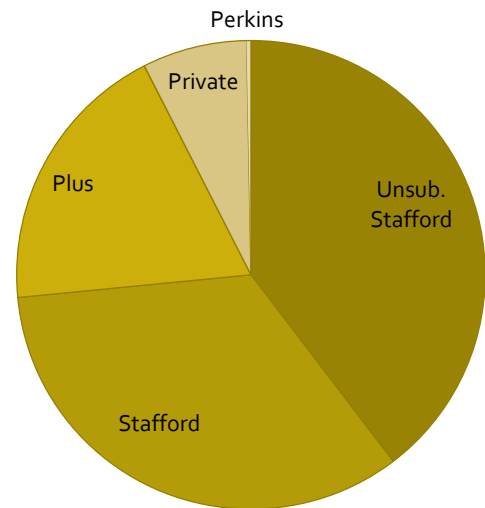
presumably in decline while the U.S. Congress decides whether to dissolve it, but also because students are rejecting the loan due to higher-than-expected interest rates.

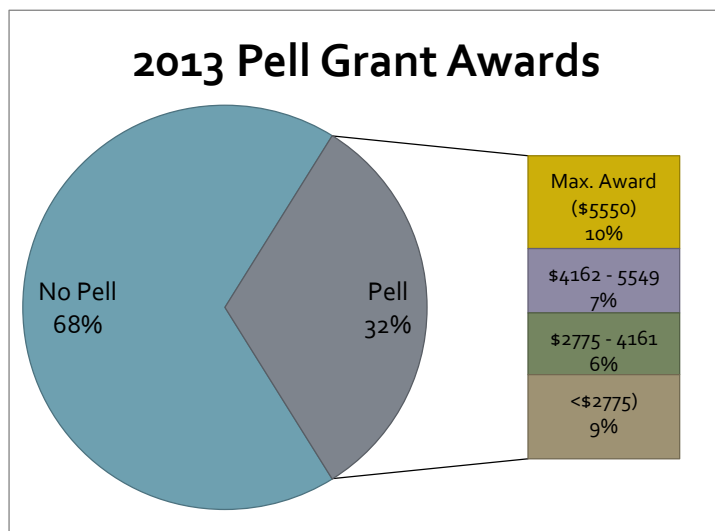

Pell Grants Carry On

2013 Pell Grant Awards



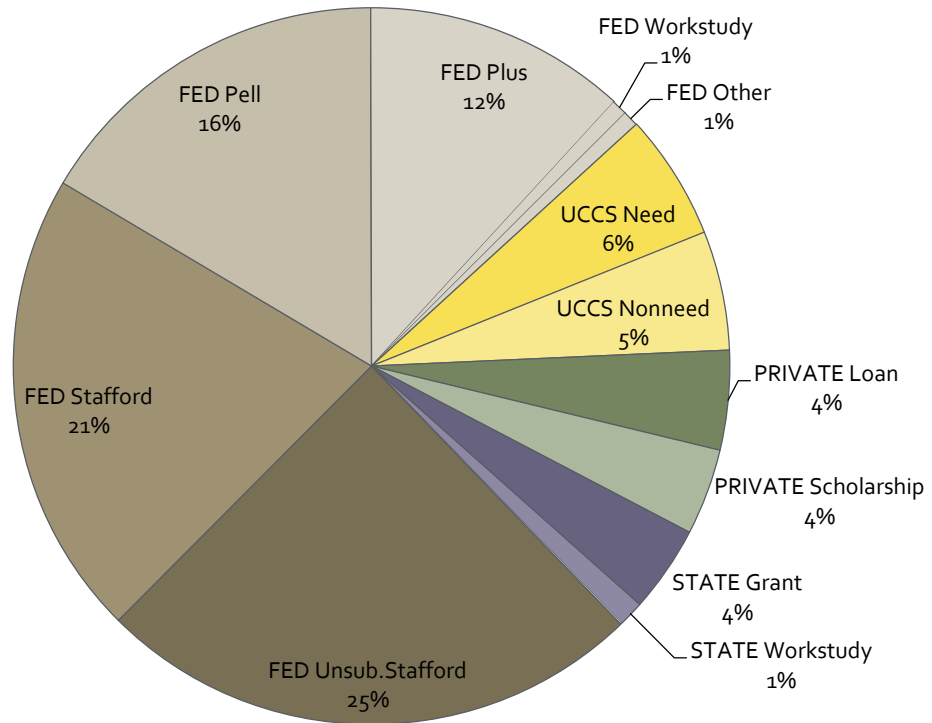
Pell Grants continue to be an important part of undergraduate financial aid packages. In 2013, and additional 150 students received Pell Grants, an increase of 6% compared to 2012. While the number of recipients grew by 6%, the amount disbursed increased by 5% from \$9,939,280 to \$10,444,740. The average award did not change substantially from \$3851 last year to \$3825 this year.

Approximately 32% of UCCS undergraduates received Pell Grants in 2013, including 10% of undergraduates who received the maximum Pell Grant amount of \$5550. Approximately 7% received at least half of the maximum amount, and another 15% received \$2774 or less.

Reliance on Federal Aid

As seen through financial aid disbursements, the institution and students rely heavily on federal aid. While institutional, private, and state aid have increased since the previous aid year, these forms of aid comprise a small slice of total disbursements.

2013 Undergraduate Financial Aid

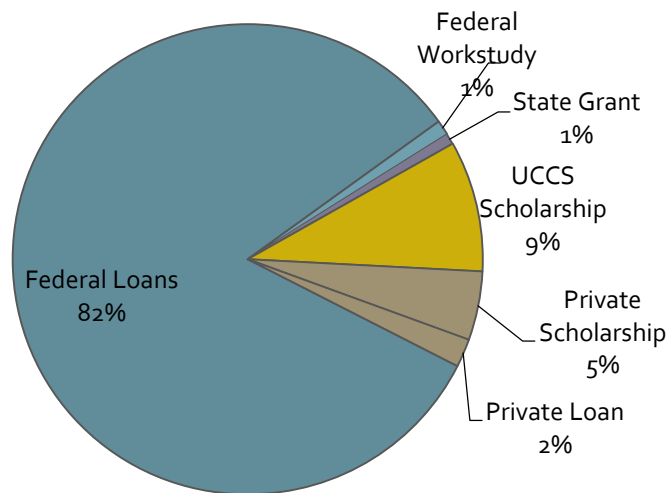


Graduate Student Financial Aid

Sources and Types of Aid

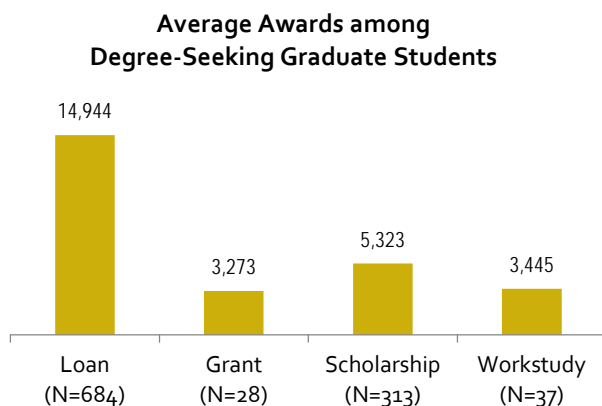
Financial aid for graduate students excludes (a) several types of aid that are only available to undergraduate students, such as the Pell Grant among others, (b) earnings from university employment except work study, and (c) employee tuition waivers. Like undergraduate students, the bulk of aid disbursed to graduate students is in the form of federal loans. Institutional and private aid comprise 16% of the disbursements to graduate students while federal workstudy and state aid each comprise 1% of the total aid disbursed.

Average Awards among Degree-Seekers

Among the 1,646 *degree-seeking graduate* students, 42% did not apply for financial aid. Among those who did, the average aid award among recipients of each type of aid is shown below. For example, among the 684 master’s and doctoral students, the average loan amount was \$14,944. Their total loan amounts ranged from \$1,500 to \$35,489 for aid year 2013.



Only 28 received grant aid worth, on average, \$3,273 and 37 students received workstudy awards worth an average of \$3,445. In comparison, many more graduate students (313) received a scholarship with an average amount of \$5,323.

Common Forms of Graduate Aid

The most common form of aid to graduate students is the Federal Stafford Unsubsidized Loan, which makes up 79% of all financial aid disbursed to graduate career students. The next largest disbursement is the UCCS Institutional Need-Based Scholarship, the sum of which comprises 6% of the aid.

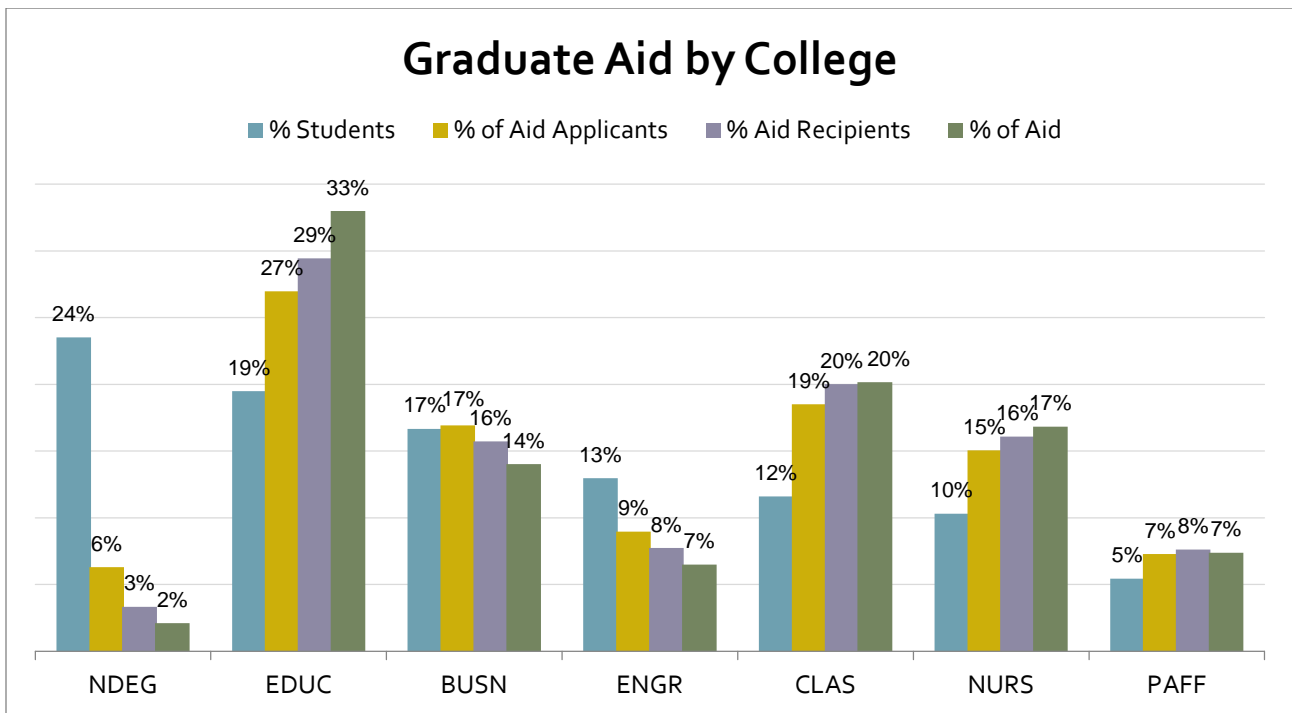
Financial aid for graduate students includes disbursements to students in the non-degree graduate career. These are students who are not seeking a master's or doctorate degree but may be pursuing additional graduate-level coursework. As shown in the table (below), the 489 non-degree graduate students are 23% of the graduate student population but only 28 are receiving financial aid.

Aid by College

Each college's share of students, aid applicants, aid recipients, and aid awarded is shown below. Note that aid varies according to a student's budget and calculated need, both of which vary by tuition rates. The tuition rates are not shown here, but available online at <http://www.uccs.edu/bursar/bursar--cashiering-office/tuition-and-fees.html>. The tuition differences are fairly minimal, but mentioned here because higher tuition rates can increase students' cost of attendance and the amount of aid they may receive. The NURS tuition rate is the highest, followed closely by ENGR and BUSN, then PAFF and EDUC, with CLAS having the lowest tuition rate. (The difference between the lowest and highest tuition rates is approximately \$600 for residents.)

Only Business (BUSN) and Public Affairs (PAFF) show consistent proportions across the percentage of students enrolled, the percentage of aid applicants, the percentage of aid recipients, and the percentage of total aid disbursed. Programs like Engineering show a disproportionate amount of aid (7%) versus the number of graduate students (13%), but 9% of the Engineering students are international students who are ineligible for aid and do not apply for it. The students in the College of Education are more likely to accept loans and have higher loan averages than the other students, which may account for the disproportionate amount of aid awarded (33%) to these students. The same pattern holds for CLAS and NURS, the latter of which has the highest tuition rate. And, of course, non-degree graduate students (NDEG) are usually ineligible for most types of financial aid.
